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# This Strikes Us ...

There is no reason not to take Senator Barack Obama's message of personal responsibility to heart.

As we have noted before, some years ago when Bill Cosby went off the rails and started slamming black folks for not accepting responsibility for their own predicament, we took issue with the comedian.

Back then we wrote that we didn't like the message and we thought the messenger was an inappropriate one.

We later recanted. At some point we reasoned that we simply cannot wait around for a guardian angel to tell us what we need to hear. In spite of Cosby's rather slim credentials to take on the role of social critic and in spite of the fact that society throws some rather formidable obstacles into the path of minority citizens, the message of personal responsibility still must be delivered.

Now it appears to be Obama's turn to deliver that message. At least that's what he and his campaign believe.

So Obama, who has attempted for the most part to run a race-neutral campaign, has on several occasions spoken to black audiences about the need to accept responsibility. Just a couple of such occasions, mind you.

He has also addressed issues of the lack of health care, of an unjust criminal justice system, of home foreclosures and so forth. In fact, the bulk of his speeches on domestic policy focus on such matters.

But even so, Obama's few speeches on accepting personal responsibility show a lack of "balance" says the Rev. Jesse Jackson Sr. who went on a bit of a rant a few weeks ago and issued his version of "loving criticism."

His version of "loving criticism" included a remark that he would like to lop off the Obama family jewels while referring to black people as n\*\*\*\*\*s. Ouch ... love really does hurt, doesn't it?

In his apology, Jackson suggested that Obama was out of balance. "[African-Americans] are number one in infant mortality, number one in life expectancy, number one in unemployment, number one in the home foreclosure crisis," said Jackson asking that Obama be sure to include remarks to that effect when he addressed black audiences.

Once again, Obama gets pummeled by his friends in this campaign.

Getting pummeled in politics, however, is to be expected whether it's by friends or enemies. Obama's got a pretty thick skin by now or he would have crawled into some little hole back in Chicago and gotten a full-time job teaching law. As Mike Huckaby, former candidate for the Republican Party presidential nomination famously said, "if you can't stand the sight of your own blood, you shouldn't be in politics."

So enough of the crocodile tears for Obama.

It's easy to take Jackson to task for his intemperate, inaccurate remarks. Jackson is famous, at least in part, for shooting his mouth off before he has given any thought to the consequences. Enough of that also.

It's our opinion that Obama cannot speak loudly or often enough, especially after he is president, of the need for African-Americans to accept personal responsibility for their own actions – actions in particular that lead to lack of educational attainment. That lack of educational attainment, as we should all know by now, leads to high rates of unemployment, to high out-of-wedlock high pregnancy rates, to high rates of incarceration, to high rates of health problems compared to the general population.

Obama probably will, according to all indications, become our 44th president and when he does, we hope that the black community can hear more of his message about taking control of our own lives.

It will be extremely difficult for minorities in general to not accept Obama's message of self reliance. The product of a single parent home whose mother relied on food stamps for a period and who was raised, in part, by his grandparents, Obama's story is not all that different from some many people in the black community.

There's more to consider should Obama succeed in his quest to gain the Oval Office. As president, he will have no easier task than did President Bill Clinton had in alleviating the difficulties that minority citizens of this nation face from systemic racism. Being black will gain him no advantage with Congress, with big business and with an assortment of other institutions that are mired in their traditions.

But the fact that Obama will have earned the nation's top job will undoubtedly cause numerous more folks to accept the idea that such racism no longer exists. On so many levels, things will not automatically get any easier for African-Americans. Unless, of course, we ourselves are so inspired by the Obama story, and his message, that we accept as an article of faith ... and hope – yes, we can.

Save Our Scott (a coalition of Scott alumni, Old West End residents and other citizens concerned about saving Jesup W. Scott High School and preserving Toledo's heritage) is mounting a week-long publicity campaign to raise community awareness and mobilize support for saving Scott High School.

According to the group's recent press release, they desire a worldclass quality education for students attending Scott and believe that this can best be delivered in a unique learning environment - a newly renovated Scott High School facility. They will be making the case that by renovating Scott with 21st Century mechanical systems and making it a showcase of green technologies, new life can be breathed into the landmark structure and educate today's and generations of students to come. They will also endeavor to explain the complex situation involving Toledo Public Schools (TPS) and the Ohio School Facilities Commission (OSFC) where the renovation dollars would come from.

Renovation is possible, says the group, providing TPS follows the will of the people. TPS must urge the OSFC for special consideration regarding Scott and also must apply for grants and other funding mechanisms that are available.

They feel that along with Scott alumni fundraising and a concerted effort to recruit and retain Scott students, Scot High School can once again become a

fully-equipped state of the art school, one that people will be proud to send their children to. Saving and renovating this historic structure and neighborhood icon is something the group says they can do and something they must do.

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# South African Education Delegation Visits Toledo

A high-level delegation of South African educators and labor leaders arrived in Toledo last week to study the nationally recognized Toledo Plan (Intern Program) and other local initiatives as part of a four-city best-practices tour.

The delegation of nine included the general secretary of the Education Labour Relations Council (ELRC), Dhaya Govender, four leaders of national trade unions and four superintendents of provincial departments of education (South Africa has nine provinces in all).

The purpose of the trip, and several others like it to other places of the globe, are to seek solutions to the problems plaguing South African educational efforts.

"Despite large amounts of money invested, we don't seem to be creating a dream for our children," Govender told The Truth last week in between sessions with representatives of the Toledo Federation of Teachers.

"It's about results," said Govender. "And it's also about perceptions and about value." The group heard presentations on the Toledo Plan, the Toledo Review and Alternative Compensation System (TRACS), the professionalization of teach-

professionalization of teaching and school consultation programs, among others.

The South Africans have a goal of addressing several key areas of concern as they travel the globe looking at what others are doing in their efforts to achieve educational success, according to Govender. They are looking at issues such as school safety, recruitment and retention of teachers, academic achievement, performance

management and teacher professionalization.

Toledo's programs offered the delegation an opportunity to take a close look at this district's attempt to increase teacher professionalism, said Patricia Keefer, assistant director for the International Affairs Department of the American Federation of Teachers (AFT). The AFT has partnered with the ELRC on this tour of selected American districts although the cost has been borne entirely by the ELRC.

The other three districts were Chicago's Quest Center for Professional Develop-

ment, the ABC United School District in southern California and New York City.

South Africa currently has any number of challenges to educational attainment, chief among them are poverty and unemployment. Unemployment hovers around the 30 percent mark for the nation.

As a result of these twin issues, in the educational arena school officials need assistance in dealing with problems of drugs, gangs and safety, in particular. In addition, said Govender, the problem of teacher recruitment bedevils South African leaders. The country's pool of talented educators is constantly being poached by other English-speaking nations.

And even as the teaching ranks are being plundered, South Africa's population, especially the lower income ranks, are increasing disproportionately due to immigration from less fortunate countries such as its neighbor Zimbabwe

The difficulties that were spawned by apartheid have not been eradicated by any means, noted Govender. There is still a privileged white class and three other groups in a descending economic chain – colored, Indian subcontinent ethnics and black indigenous. Blacks, the poorest segment, make up the bulk – almost 80 percent – of the South African population.

That economic disparity is reflected in the educational attainment gaps among the disparate racial groups.

South African educators and labor leaders have also visited countries in South and Central America, as well as those in Europe and Asia, as part of this extensive factfinding mission.

The delegation on this trip to the United States included Govender; Matseliso E. Dipholo, vice president of the South African Democratic Teachers' Union (SADTU); Nomfundo N. Mkhulisi, vice president of SADTU; Henry Hendricks, executive director of the National Professional Teachers Organization; Eliam M. Biyela, executive director of the National Teachers' Union; John H. Jeftha, president of the Cape Teachers' Professional Association; Reginald Lubisi, superintendent general of education of KwaZulu-Natal Province; Hubert M. Mweli, superintendent general of North-West Province; Zwoitwaho C. Nevhutalu, superintendent general of Limpopo Province and Ron Swartz, superintendent of Western Cape.

This month Social Security introduces a new "Retirement Estimator" at www.socialsecurity.gov. Getting a personalized online estimate of your future retirement benefits is now easier than ever before. The online Retirement Estimator is a convenient, secure and quick financial planning tool that lets workers calculate how much they might expect to receive in Social Security benefits when they retire. The attractive new feature of this calculator is that it eliminates the need to manually key in years of earnings information. It's so easy to use.

Visit www.socialsecurity.gov/ estimator. To get an estimate, you'll need to enter your first and last name, date of birth, Social Security number, mother's maiden name and place of birth. If the information matches our records, then you can enter an expected retirement age and future wages. The Estimator combines this information with the information that we have on record, including your yearly earnings, to provide a quick and reliable online benefit estimate.

To protect your privacy, only the final retirement estimates are given to you online. The Retirement Estimator does not show your earnings record information on which the final ben-

efit estimate was calculated. And it does not reveal any personal information, such as your address, earnings or other information, that could lead to identity theft.

The Estimator also will let you create "what if" scenarios. You can, for example, change "stop work" dates or expected future earnings to create and compare different retirement options. # **Bonita Adams: Inspired to Expose The Truth Through Her Gospel Play ministry**

Bonita Adams, founder of Exposing Truth Ministries, has been writing gospel plays for about 16 years. Her most recent effort, 23rd Street, was commissioned by the Clarence Smith Community Chorus and

produced this past June at the Maumee Indoor Theatre.

Her very first play, *EX-POSED*, has been produced every year for the last 14 years in local churches, The University of Toledo, the Valentine

Theatre, the Owens Community College Center for the Performing Arts and the Maumee Indoor Theatre.

In fact, admirers of Adams' work had the opportunity to see *EXPOSED* again this past

weekend at the Maumee Indoor (See play review on the following page.)

In between those works, Adams has written numerous other plays, such as My Mother Prayer For Me, More than Conquerors and Putting Christ Back In Christmas. She has written a book, puppet shows and Black History Month plays.

But as Adams tells it, she has not always considered herself to be an artist.

"When I was growing up, I belonged to St. Paul A.M.E. Zion and we would do different things, put on little skits." Adams recalls. "I had ideas but I did not consider myself to be a writer at that point in high school."

Sixteen years ago, however, Adams heard about a book entitled A Divine Revelation of Hell by Mary K. Baxter. "It got me thinking about the fact that people don't believe that hell is real," she says. Adams had been told about the book by her mother, and pastor, Rev. Shirley Sparks, of Walls Memorial Church. This would turn out to be Adams' own revelation. She did not read the book. but the title itself got her brain churning.

"I woke up one morning and started writing. The first half of the play took about six months to write," says Adams. The second half of the play was an entirely different experience. "Then I woke up one day and was inspired to write the second half in one day," she adds.

That play, EXPOSED, was

performed at UT two years later and Adams part-time career as a playwright, director and producer was launched. An audience member for that first production belonged to Mt. Pilgrim Church and asked Adams if it could be performed there.

That got the ball rolling for Adams. "Lots of people did that and eventually we kept doing the play over and over again."

In 2003, Adams and her ETM group decided to take the play to a new level with a performance at the Valentine Theatre. Music was added and the direction was turned over to a more experienced director, Sylvia Carter, who also directed Adams' latest play, 23<sup>rd</sup> Street, for the Clarence Smith Community Choir.

Adams, a business/computerteacher with Springfield Local Schools, has had a great deal of assistance in her artistic endeavors, and not the least of that assistance has been provided by her husband James. James Adams has appeared in most of her plays receiving acclaim especially for his portrayal as Satan in EXPOSED.

Her mother, Sparks, has also been there along the way as have a number of veteran cast members such as Edward Lindsey and Steve Frazier. James and Bonita have two daughters — LaTosha and Tamika. Tamika, who recently earned her degree in theatre from UT, has been a help over the years as her mother learned to hone her directing etitle.

What's next for Toledo's foremost gospel playwright?

A local writer/musician/ songwriter saw the production of 23<sup>rd</sup> Street and got Adams interested in a book titled *Passing By Samaria* by Sharon E. Foster. Adams has already completed the play based on the book and is waiting to hear from the author if ETM has permission to produce the work.

The book, written by an African-American deals with racial issues and "could help with conciliation," says Adams.

Adams would also like to take EXPOSED, and perhaps some of her other plays, on the road. She would love to make some contacts in other parts of the country and obtain financial backing for such plans.

She would also like to take her artistry into new directions by heightening the technology or becoming more innovative in other directions. She was particularly inspired by the recent Toledo appearance of *The Lion King* with its use of costumes and puppetry. And somewhere down the line, given Adams interest intechnology, Christian video games might be in her future.

Adams worked for Toledo Public Schools for a number of years as a secretary. She eventually returned to college and earned a bachelor's of education from UT in 1998 and became a teacher in the Spring-field Local Districtshortly thereafter. She is currently working on her master's degree in educational technology.

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

# The Enemy Gets "EXPOSED" in Bonita Adams' Religious Drama

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I've seen Bonita Adams' scripturally-based religious drama with music, EX-POSED, three times now and I never grow tired of seeing the Devil going "to and fro', seeking whom he can destroy." The latest production, Saturday, July 19, 2008, was staged at the Maumee Indoor Theater and featured as the special guest artist, none other than Toledo's very own powerhouse gospel singer, Debra Brock, first lady of Mt. Nebo Baptist Church.

Brock was definitely the star of the show, but even her incredible vocals that scaled the ceiling of the theater and brought the audience to their collective feet could not upstage James Adams' "Satan."

Anyone who does not know this kind and gentle man would wonder why he plays the devil so well. He is so deliciously evil onstage, those who don't know much about theatre might wonder, "Is he really like that? How can Bonita be married to someone so cruel?"

Don't worry. It's just good acting. Mr. Adams plays a role that was written for him by Mrs. Adams and the two founders of ETM Productions (their theatre company) have pulled off a theatrical feat with EX-POSED.

Since I've reviewed the play previously, I won't repeat myself describing the devious plot, the multitude of characters (there must be at least 20, but most of them are demons!) and the fantastic dialog, which at times is hilariously funny and at other times poignant and sad, leaving you in tears.

I also won't repeat descriptions of the fine performances given by actors who've played these roles before nor will I comment on the performances of those who made their debut in this

performances by new characters, the most memorable of which was Laura Lawrence singing "I've Just Seen Jesus."

Lawrence brought the house down with her operatic trills that soared into the heavens. Speaking of Jesus, a crucifixion scene in the play, almost as brutal (if not as long) as the one in "The Passion of the Christ" had a chilling effect on everyone who saw the play in the afternoon.

People openly wept and praised their Savior for shed-

Several recordings of gospel female group, "The Difference" were played throughout, giving the play a professional quality on par with shows like Tyler Perry's.

The group's inimitable harmony on "The Blood" sent shivers down my spine and brought me to tears, along with many others in the audience during the crucifixion scene.

I kept wishing during long pauses while actors playing multiple roles changed costumes that someone would put on some more of "The Difference" recordings to fill the silence" that seemed to stretch out longer and longer each time.

Or praise dancer extraordinaire Shanea Smith could have performed another of her beautifully choreographed routines. Dancreographed routines and Asia Wall who performed what I call the "Eden ballet" choreographed by Brandon



Wall (who also acted and sang in the play) were also excellent and I could have seen more of them.

Those long gaps could have also been filled by Brock leading the audience in more songs like the one we all thoroughly enjoyed singing in the second act, "In The Name of Jesus" (that might have been hard on her voice as the lead singer of the show, however). I'd have settled for the "demons" (Smith, Ty Brock Jr., Christian Lamar Dale, Bey, Nicole Marie Rice,

Sharon L. Henley, Asia Wall, JaJuan Turner, Mardest Crosby, Smith, Jordan Purley, Anthony, Caleb and Brandon Rice) doing a hip-hop routine like the one they did in "hell" when they celebrated all of the destruction and mayhem they had caused on earth.

Showing that religious folks aren't always somber and pious, Adams has written one of the funniest scenes I've seen in a play of this kind. There's none of the vulgarity and slapstick (Continued on Next Page)

# Do You Remember Those Embarrassing Cousins at the Family Reunion?

In view of the recent news headlines, I feel I would be remiss if I don't shed some light on that little-known couple that has managed to capture the undivided attention of the financial world during the past few days.

Don't be embarrassed if, when you first heard the names FannieMae and FreddieMac, you pictured someone speaking with a pronounced Southern twang

and maybe a wisp of a straw dangling from the side of their mouths. I know I did, but, in my case, it was 20-plus years ago.

To me, honestly, even to-day their names sound like some kinfolk from somewhere down South. Um, maybe those cousins that showed up at my last family reunion with mason jars of homemade moonshine and brown-stained teeth from a

lifelong love affair with Redman or some other cheaper brand of chewing tobacco? You know... the kind of distant relatives that make you want to demand a DNA test.

But don't be fooled by their hick nicknames, FannieMae and FreddieMac -the Federal National Mortgage Association and the Federal Home Mortgage Corporation, respectively represent the very backbone of the housing industry in this country. For most people, this is where things get confusing. Are they government agencies or public held corporations? Just think of them as business mutations-they are part federal government and part public business entities.


FannieMae was created first in 1938 by the government in order to expand the flow of mortgage funds in all communities, at all times, under all economic condi-

tions and to help lower the costs to buy a home. In 1970, its clone, FreddieMac, was created. They are both federally chartered corporations, owned by shareholders that serve as quasi-governmental agencies.

Basically, these two mammoth companies offer banks and mortgage brokers the ultimate OPM opportuare eventually sold to Fannie or Freddie, the mortgage lending guidelines they establish are followed industry wide. When your loan officer tells you what documentation he or she needs to approve you loan — such as pay stubs, tax forms, etc. — they are probably following the mandate of Freddie or Fannie.

Briefly, this is their

However, keep in mind, being a sort of custodian for other people's money is like babysitting someone's kid. It's not a responsibility to be taken lightly. If a bank shows a lack of diligence in following the guidelines set by Fannie and Freddie, it will lose the rights to sell loans to them, and it could face other severe conse-



nity. That is, they allow continuous access to "other people's money." In a Robin Hood-like fashion, they take money from the rich (investors) and redistribute it to the needed (homebuyers). The amount that banks have available to loan to homebuyers from their own assets is finite, but Fannie and Freddie have an infinite source of funds thanks to the government backing of the securities they sell, which are actually bundles of the mortgages they buy.

Fannie and Freddie only operate in the backroom of the mortgage industry, commonly referred to as the secondary market by real estate professionals. That means you can't call either of them directly and apply for a loan yourself. Nevertheless, if you receive a mortgage loan today, Freddie or Fannie will more than likely have an influence on your transaction from the beginning.

Since most loans today

method of operation. Let's say that you get a mortgage on your new home from the Northern Ohio Investment Company (NOIC). NOIC, like any bank, has limitations on how much money it can lend as a function of its asset base. If your loan sits in NOIC's portfolio, it constricts how much the mortgage bank can loan to others.

On the other hand, if NOIC sells the rights of their loans to Fannie Mae or FreddieMae, it turns those loans back into cash, which it can then go out and loan again. You keep making your loan payments to NOIC, and it passes these funds on to Fannie or Fannie. Fannie or Fannie is supposed to make money by borrowing funds at a lower interest rate than you can.

Can you imagine if you were able to loan someone else's money out and receive a portion of the interest and fees charged for it ... only in America.

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
