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# Fighting For the Young Black Male

I have been speaking about the challenge of responding to black pain with social justice advocate Romal Tune, who has released his debut book, God's Graffiti: Inspiring Stories for Teens. This is the finale of our four-part conversation on practical ways to bring about reconcilation and healing from the pain and brokenness so prevalent among black youth.

Perryman: We ended our last segment talking about the recruiting aspect of the gang paradigm that could be also be used by Christians to compete effectively for the lives and purposes of our black youth. Are there other features of the gang model that might serve as an example?

Tune: Gangs are also trying to become stronger. They're fielding better collaborations because they realize there's strength in numbers. I'm always saying to myself this is what the Church should also be do-

ing. We too, should be crosspollinating and extending our boundaries intentionally working and learning from each other. But often, churches perpetuate some of the unhealthy things about gangs. We're hyper-territorial and fight for turf where these gangs don't even do that anymore. Instead, we should recognize that we are actually stronger together and begin to connect with other churches to share ministry best practices and work together to help counsel the distressed.

Perryman: With the amount of blood that's flowing through our streets from black male on black male violence, do you feel that the way to address these issues is through small, incremental change or through large-scale public policy solutions?

Tune: I think that we should have a ground and air campaign, if you will. The air campaign is large political engagement, changing gun laws and even how we talk about changing the laws. But also, policies that help to perpetuate opportunity, make our schools and funding fair and equitable, and deal with discriminatory laws that disproportionately incarcerate black males and things of that sort are needed.

On the other hand, some of these problems cannot be changed by just one piece of legislation. For example, you can't legislate away the pain and experiences that people are going through. That requires human interaction and I think even the White House is seeing that and when you look at some of the programs that they're funding, they're all about programs that engage people in very practical ways. So a ground campaign is also needed, one which requires a very strategic long-term approach and where the outcomes and deliverables are very clear in terms of the change you hope to see and how we're going to get to that change

The challenge for the church, however, is that often, they don't really have any relationships with their surrounding community. The facts show that if you don't have a relationship with the people in your community, no matter what you offer, they're still not coming because they don't know you. A lot of churches will do a community-based event in the church parking lot, and say it's open to the community and then are angry when few people come. It's still not theirs. So how do we take things into the community and intentionally engage our neighborhoods and build take a lot to

Perryman: What is the role of municipal government or politicians?

Tune: There are some politicians who are effectively going into office and are serious about moving resources and changing policies in ways that actually empower communities.

They are helping to remove disparities and the barriers that perpetuate a permanent underclass of poverty and changing those things through better policies and laws. And then, there are other politicians who get in and are only concerned about re-election and so you end up with a lot of broken promises and people who do a lot of what I call ear-hustling, just to get votes and never delivering. Those are the folks that make it harder for communities

So, we have to be very intentional when we elect people to office, to really hold them accountable before they get elected and also accountable for their answers once they get elected.

Perryman: Finally, what is it that you want those who purchase your book God's Graffiti to come away with?

**Tune:** What I've seen people take away from it, just reading some of the responses and people who are

on Amazon, Facebook and Twitter, is already happening. Teens and adults are sharing testimonies on how, through this book, they are finding that God is helping them find healing and is reconciling some situations that they have long ignored. It's also about helping young people understand that some of the things that you went through and that people blame you for, are not your fault but now you have to overcome.

God's Graffiti is really about helping people find hope and to stop covering up what they have been through so that they can be unapologetically themselves and pursue God's true plan for their lives. The endgame of the book is that you can overcome the pain of your past and God will show you how to pursue your purpose.

# **Ending the Wall Street Tax on Main Street Beer Drinkers**

With baseball season in full swing, Ohio families hosting friends for an Indians or Reds game may have to pay more for beer and soft drinks – all because Wall Street megabanks have found another way to game the system.

At one time, banks were just banks. They made loans and they held checking and savings accounts. But nearly 20 years ago, banks also got into the business of selling insurance and holding securities. We have long moved beyond the days of the local trusts, savings and loans, and community banks.

Today, Wall Street megabanks also control commodities that manufacturers depend on to deliver affordable prices to consumers. Banks are not just making small business loans. They own everything from electric power plants, to oil pipelines and tankers. And they even own the warehouses that store aluminum and copper. Simply put, these megabanks by owning too many of the resources our nation needs to operate are putting our markets and financial system at risk.

Whether or not you believe that a bank holding your savings account should also be in the business of refining and shipping oil, there is no place for banks to engage in anti-competitive practices. But that's what is happening today. Wall Street banks are driving up costs on American manufacturers and consumers by hoarding commodities.

Recently, Mary Jane Saunders, general counsel at the Beer Institute, the trade association representing American brewers, beer importers and suppliers, explained how the supply and, less directly, the price of aluminum affect the cost of beer. Because the warehouses that store aluminum are owned and controlled by Wall Street, brewers and beer importers across the country have been paying higher prices and higher fees for aluminum that is used for production.

There are more than 60 breweries and about 1,780 direct brewery jobs throughout Ohio. These breweries are dependent on aluminum for their kegs and cans.

Recently, Tim Weiner of MillerCoors, which operates a brewery in Trenton, Ohio testified at a Senate hearing that, "Aluminum users, like MillerCoors, are being forced to wait in some cases over 18 months to take physical delivery due to [...] warehouse practices or pay the high physical premium to get aluminum today." Mr. Weiner estimated that this is costing businesses and consumers \$3 billion per year.

When banks control both the supply and price, manufacturers and consumers pay the price. It's not right, and we need to end this Wall Street tax on Main Street beer drinkers. We need to take action, and there are some simple steps to do so.

First, the Federal Reserve should issue clear guidance on permissible non-bank activities. It should also consider placing limitations on those that expose banks and taxpayers to undue risk.

Next, the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC) – which investigates speculative practices



 needs to crack down on anticompetitive practices.
 The CFTC needs to stop the bottleneck that allows the banks – which own the aluminum – to charge higher prices to end users like beer and soft drink makers.

Third, Congress needs to pass the Terminating Bailouts for Taxpayer Fairness Act (TBTF), legislation that Senator David Vitter (R-LA) and I introduced to stop these behemoths from taking advantage of manufacturers and consumers. Our bill sets forth a plan that would prevent any one financial institution from becoming so risky and over-leveraged that it could put our economy on the brink of collapse or trigger the need for a federal bailout.

Ohio manufacturers and consumers should not have the price of their gas, beer, soft drinks, or electricity driven up by Wall Street speculators. That's why I will fight to ensure that Wall Street megabanks will never again monopolize our nation's wealth or gamble away the American dream.



# When Death Comes Prematurely It's a night I will never forget

I was in college, celebrating a friend's 21st birthday. A round of toasts went up. Someone poured libations in memory of all our friends who had been killed or sent to prison. Then, a friend rose to toast one more of us surviving to the age of 21.

The notion that life had reduced my friend to believing it an accomplishment for one of us to merely breathe past 21 sent me reeling.

Our generation of black Americans was supposed to be the first not to be judged by our race or the color of our skin. Instead, we had come of age to find ourselves the most incarcerated on the planet and most murdered in the country.

"Grandma," I would ask days later, still searching for understanding: "What happened? How did things turn out like this?"

Her response was the crux of my speech

e crux of my speech to the 104th NAACP convention yesterday. She leaned in and spoke softly: "It's sad but it's simple: We got what we fought for, but we lost what we had."

Those words echo in my mind whenever I think about Travvon Mar-

tin, and it's why I once again ask for your signature in his memory.

With a background in finance Cox is also a student of history. He has recently been viewing Toledo through the eyes of the book Holy Toledo, a biography of Sam "Golden Rule" Jones. (Jones was a local innovative businessman who served as Toledo's mayor from 1897 to 1904 and was ranked as the fifth best mayor in American history.)

Cox wants to provide local businesses with the same support and resources that allowed Sam Jones to be a business man ahead of his time.

Cox's father, a well-known management consultant, initiated his son into the study of business organization at a very early age. Since that time he has never slowed his efforts to learn more and continually improves his knowledge by seeking out information on the best practices in business and management.

One part of Cox's platform is his view of the relationship between the city administration and Toledo Public Schools. "I do not believe city government should be in any kind of control of education" is his position. He sees the education system and city government as a strong partnership but one that has different motivations.

They need to work closely because "they define who we are as a city" Cox said. He also applies this same philosophy to state governments as well when it comes to defining the requirements and limitations of the local school boards. He dismisses the argument of charter schools versus public

schools as a political one. "Obviously public schools can do a good job. But there are some good charter schools."

In addressing the division between the city council and the mayor's office, Cox said that "there will be issues where they don't agree but it should not be an us versus them" situation. Another thing of his recommendations that may help improve efficiency and reduce contention is to change the structure of the city council. A change from the current number of 12 to nine will reduce the

He is not prepared to designate any particular area ripe for economic development but believes there is potential in all of the areas. "Any of those neighborhoods that is stable but not improving or is deteriorating deserves the attention first," Cox suggested.

Cox was born in Detroit, the son of two native Toledoans. He lived in several states before moving to Toledo with his mother. He graduated from Start High School in 1971. He obtained a Bachelor of Science degree from The University of Toledo in 1979 and has worked in the field of finance for almost 40 years

He has been a loan officer, commercial loan reviewer, and loan chairman for a community development corporation. In 1990 he joined the city administration as a financial assistance specialist and is currently a neighborhood development specialist in the Department of Neighborhoods. He has been president of the city supervisor, technical, and professional union (AFSCME Local 2058) since June, 2003.







# 'A Family Affair'

She thought he was a pain in the neck, all gangly with legs going this way and that, asking her out until she couldn't say anything but "yes." It didn't take long for her to realize, though, that she couldn't lay her hands on a better man.

You know the story of how your parents fell in love, but there are a lot of things you don't know about them. And in the new book, A Family Affair by ReShonda Tate Billingsley, finding out could be a painful thing.


Everyone assumed that over the family business someday. It was his birthright, really, but there was one problem: Kendall didn't want it. No, he had other

aimed at families of the SouthSide of Lima who are looking for a way out of their situation, but are held back by lack of resources or, in some cases, they have not been able to utilize resources available through state and local agencies in a way that allows them to climb out of the grip of poverty.

The youth-focused part of the plan is called The Halcyon Project and proposes unconventional ways to produce or discover scholarship money for every child involved in the Center's programming.

When Mark Vaughn retired from teaching, he decided to dedicate some time, just as his father did before him, to the children who come to the center. He started a basketball team, and as the news spread about the South-Side Spartans and within weeks the team had grown to 20 members. He makes demands on them, stresses self-discipline and responsibility as he teaches them

the rules of the game of basketball and the game of life.

The weekend with his team opened up new realizations. "Our kids are without social skills. They're okay on the court, but they have no idea how to conduct themselves outside of their basic home environment. We have to work on that."

This key piece of information is the core section of the Halcyon Project for children, and the SHOW-WAY Initiative for adults. Teaching how to navigate through the complicated cultures of business and economics is challenging at best; being dumped in the middle of those situations without the necessary social skills means nothing but frustration, embarrassment and failure for the majority of the people who can afford it

The weekend was a rollercoaster of emotion for the players and the coaches. The SouthSide Spartans participated in their first tournament and took the third place position.

Through all the chaos, one child stepped outside his station. He demonstrated he had learned the skills Coach Vaughn had been stressing for the past few weeks. As team manager he took his responsibilities to task and did a noteworthy job of keeping his team on track.

And people took notice.
Other coaches, staff
members at OSU, even the
wives of coaches were impressed by his eloquence,
inquisitive mind, and attention to duty; so much so
he was presented a scholarship to the Ohio State
University. At 12 years of
age.

Proving the theory of the Halcyon Project Objective – to prepare the students to be ready when opportunities arise; and that the environment in which a child was raised can be utilized as a springboard to successful outcomes no matter what may have occurred in the past.

It is possible to change the world one child at a time. Wow.















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
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
