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Hitting the Right Target

If nothing else, the alleged racist comments made by Los Angeles Clippers owner Donald Sterling to girlfriend V. Stiviano will tell whether the African-American community has a pulse. Last week, the celebrity news organization TMZ posted a recording online in which a male voice, purportedly Sterling's, argues with Stiviano over an Instagram photo of her with Magic Johnson. In the conversation, Sterling also told his girlfriend not to bring blacks to "his

How should a submissive black community that has a recent history of accepting injustices without protest, respond?

"Commissioner Adam Silver is going to need to be able to do something about this," says public relations professional B. J. Fischer of Thread Marketing. "Sterling has been saying a lot of this despicable stuff for a long time so he can't just sanitize this by saying 'I misspoke' because it appears to be an ongoing trend that includes a housing discrimination suit where he had to pay a \$2.8 or so million dollar judgment. With icons speaking out like Magic Johnson, one of the 20 most popular people in the country, and Michael Jordan, a guy who never wanted to get in the middle of controversy, this won't go away. There are going to be protests," adds Fischer.

So far, player protests, like the Clippers' players decision to wear their warm-ups inside out to conceal the Clippers' logo, have been subtle. The National Basketball Association, a league where nearly 80 percent of the players and a sizable proportion of the fans are black, may still feel pressured to sanction or even require Sterling to sell his team.

Yet activists such as Cynthia McKinney, outspoken former Congresswoman and Green Party presidential candidate, suggest more drastic measures. "... the likes of this Clippers owner (and others) practice their racism in private-but thanks to his girlfriend, it's all public! Notice that Sterling talks about how blacks

and Mexicans feel about each other, which is exactly the way the divide and conquer game is orchestrated. The owner doesn't want responding to Sterling will do black people at his games?? Good, that includes players, coaches, and those who stand in solidarity with them," McKinney exclaims.

However, we could be missing the point. Targeting Donald Sterling or his NBA business investment through protests, boycotts or the withdrawal of financial support by major corporate sponsors

certainly provides the emotional satisfaction that comes with revenge. Yet it is unlikely that much to erase contemporary racism, suggests Duke University professor Eduardo Bonilla-Silva, PhD:

"The remarks by Mr. Sterling are reprehensible and in keeping with his long history of anti-black sentiment and discrimination against people of

Tanzanian Archbishop to Visit Diocese of **Toledo**

Archbishop Ruzoka is to attend a fundraising event, "An East African Tragedy: Saving Lives - Keeping them Safe" that the Universal Initiative Foundation is sponsoring May 13 at The Pinnacle in Maumee. The event begins at 5:30 p.m. with a reception followed by dinner at 6:30 p.m. and comments by prominent physicians and University of Toledo award-winning missionary doctors Richard Paat and S. Amjad Hussain. The evening also includes silent and live auctions and a door prize of an iPad.

Archbishop Ruzoka is working in conjunction with the Universal Initiative Foundation, a local nonprofit founded by Don and Gisela Stiles, members of Toledo St. Patrick of Heatherdowns. The couple served as missionaries and consultants to the archbishop in 2010 and has worked to shed light on the violence in Tanzania since returning to the United States.

Since 2007, official reports indicate 290

Archbishop Paul R. Ruzoka of Tabora, tacked and their body parts cut off and sold Tanzania, is to visit the Diocese of Tole- to witch doctors in Tanzania and other parts do in May to bring awareness of atrocities of Africa. Leaders in the albinism community believe the actual number of attacks is even higher.

> The violence is driven by local belief that the body parts of albinos possess magical powers capable of bringing riches if used in potions produced by witch doctors. Another superstition believes that sex with albino women and girls can cure HIV/AIDS, resulting in the rape of albino victims.

> The Universal Initiative Foundation proposes to build a self-sustaining, secure facility for 600 children and young adults on five acres of land donated by the parish of Cheyo, one of 22 parishes under the leadership of Archbishop Ruzoka. The facility is to provide albino residents as well as nonaffected orphans a secure home with needed medical, educational and vocational opportunities. Catholic sisters and lay employees are to staff the facility on a full-time basis.

Initial funding is needed for water and energy installations, housing for staff, dormitories, kitchen and dining facilities, classrooms and a small dispensary to house, educate and care for 60 children. 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

The Hippest Trip in America: Soul Train and the Evolution of Culture & Style by Nelson George

They should have called you Super-Fly.

Yep, that's what you were, dancing in front of your TV every Saturday, spinning on the carpet and waving your arms around until you got

yelled at for "gonna break something." But you were the flyest of fly. The only thing you were going to bust was a move, just like on *Soul Train*. And in *The Hippest Trip in America* by Nelson George, you'll read about the iconic TV program that you never, ever missed.

Everyone knew that Don Cornelius had "ambition;" he was a car salesman, policeman and insurance agent before his "foghorn voice" led him to radio in 1966. He made the transition to TV two years later and he soon realized there was a need for a "black" TV show. He presented the idea, then found major corporate sponsorship, and on October 2, 1971, Soul Train appeared locally in Chicago.

The show was "'overnight hot'" but Cornelius knew there was more to this idea. With another sponsor on-board for a nationwide launch, Cornelius pitched the show to the networks, but they turned it down. He decided to syndicate *Soul Train* and moved the show to Los Angeles.

Though the music was always the focus of Soul Train, Cornelius knew that the dancers (in particular, those in the *Soul Train* line) were what brought viewers back.

In L.A., scouts kept their eyes open for promising teens who could dance, often

mining prospects from three main area clubs. Dancers performed for free and were fed chicken dinners, but the real appeal of being a Soul Train dancer was fame and the opportunity for a career in show biz. It seemed as though every regular viewer wanted to be a Soul Train regular, too.

But as much as Cornelius controlled his show (and, to a certain extent, his dancers), he couldn't control what happened culturally. Early-90s fashions confounded him, music videos concerned him, and gangsta rap made him uncomfortable. And so, though the show would continue


host – a move that arguably meant "the show was over."

From its first pages and throughout, the word "joy" crops up often in The Hippest Trip in America, and for good reason: it was everywhere in the show and even more so in this book.

I took great joy, in fact, in seeing how author Nelson George sent me to the internet. His descriptions of what happened through the years on Soul Train made me want to see, too, and there are plenty of clips online. I also liked the interviews with former dancers and the cultural frame-of-reference included here, and the history of the show - along with littleknown tidbits - made this a great (and surprisingly fastpaced) read filled with reminiscing, "love, peace, and


